Beyond teaching these fundamental skills, I introduce my students to historical and modern clarinet repertoire, basic music history, audition and performance strategies, and other important musical (and life) skills.

Each student I teach has unique strengths and weaknesses, and my teaching style varies accordingly in order to best help each student enjoy their lessons and reach their goals.

I strive to create a supportive and welcoming environment that encourages students of any background, experience, or identity to feel excited to learn, comfortable to ask questions, and inspired to excel as a musician and as a well-rounded individual.

Expectations

Practicing	Please practice throughout the week and come to lessons enthusiastic to learn. It is important to be prepared each week so that we can make the most of our time together!
Repertoire	We will go over music and exercises at each lesson for you to practice at home. These are unique for every student to help you reach your unique goals.
Attendance	Please arrive on time and prepared for lessons. If you need to cancel a lesson, please notify me at least 24 hours in advance to avoid being charged. I am committed to being flexible and accommodating in the event of an emergency, and will work with you to find a solution that meets both of our needs.

He studied bass clarinet with Paul Demers, and attended the Philadelphia International Music Festival, where he studied with Boris Allakhverdyan and Ricardo Morales.

Aside from his musical commitments, Cameron is training to be an operator of the Iris Lunar Rover mission, and enjoys nature photography, astronomy, paleontology, and spending time with his fiancée Amanda and their two cats Theo and Jasper.
